It is estimated 3.5 million people already have Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes in the UK. A further 1.1 million people have undiagnosed diabetes. With rising prevalence of obesity, the UK is facing a tsunami in the level of diabetes in the coming years.

Diabetes is therefore a priority across the UK, in England it is one of six clinical priorities with a National Diabetes Prevention Programme and recently an extra £40m Transformational Fund to improve services.
